### **CITY OF BRIDGES**

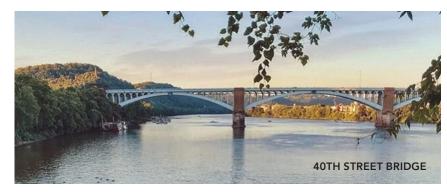
#### **Group Activity**

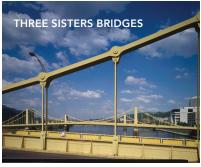
#### 1. Choose a Bridge
