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Pittsburgh Public Theater adds WHO'S AFRAID OF VIRGINIA WOOLF? to 2025 lineup The iconic play fills the place of SCOTLAND, PA after unforeseen postponement

July X, 2024 | Pittsburgh Public Theater announced it will produce the iconic Edward Albee play WHO'S AFRAID OF VIRGINIA WOOLF? in its 2024-2025 50th Anniversary Season, marking the third production of the juicy family drama in The Public's history and the first in its current home. The title fills the place of the unexpectedly postponed SCOTLAND, PA, after Pittsburgh Public Theater's commercial partners became unable to move forward with the planned regional premiere. WHO'S AFRAID OF VIRGINIA WOOLF? will open in previews March 29 and close April 6, 2025, at the O'Reilly Theater.

MARRIAGE ON THE ROCKS SERVED UP WITH A TONY AWARD

It's all fun and games until the one and only Edward Albee picks up his pen. His 1962 masterpiece *WHO'S AFRAID OF VIRGINIA WOOLF?* is a caustic cocktail of razor-sharp dialogue and electrifying performances that has kept audiences coming back for another round for decades. After a university faculty party, disillusioned professor George and his domineering wife Martha invite an unsuspecting younger couple, Nick and Honey, over for drinks. The evening devolves into a series of comedically cruel mind games and bitter confrontations, revealing deep-seated resentments and hidden truths about both couples. Buckle up for a night of explosive drama and dark humor in this dazzling theatrical powerhouse.

"Commercial partnerships like The Public's with Hal Luftig Productions for *SCOTLAND*, *PA*, come with high risks and rewards alike," Pittsburgh Public Theater Artistic Director Marya Sea Kaminski said. "We're in steadfast support of the creative team for that exciting new musical and look forward to bringing it to Pittsburgh in a future season, and we're thrilled to bring Albee's iconic show to the O'Reilly Theater stage for the first time."

Hal Luftig Productions is one of the industry's most successful and esteemed commercial theatrical production companies and is responsible for household Broadway titles like *JELLY'S LAST JAM* and *KINKY BOOTS*. Luftig has won three Tony awards and numerous Drama League awards during his career, and faced planned Chapter 11 bankruptcy in 2022 to reorganize his company's structure – a reorganization that preceded his recent successful staging of the new musical *HERE LIES LOVE*, co-conceived by David Byrne and Fatboy Slim.

"Earlier this year, I had the honor of sitting down with Pittsburgh Public Theater Artistic Director Marya Sea Kaminski and Managing Director Shaunda McDill to discuss the future of one of my favorite musicals, *SCOTLAND, PA*," Luftig said in a statement. "As one of the nation's preeminent regional theaters, The Public was the perfect choice to debut a smart, daring new adaptation of this audience favorite. The regional premiere was originally slated for a Spring 2025 opening but has been postponed for a future season to ensure that we give this show every opportunity to shine. I'm grateful to Pittsburgh Public



Theater's team for working with Hal Luftig Productions and look forward to our successful future together."

The inaugural staging of *WHO'S AFRAID OF VIRGINIA WOOLF* earned the 1963 Tony Award for Best New Play and was selected for that year's Pulitzer Prize for Drama – but the award's advisory board overruled the Pulitzer jury in objection to the show's profanity and racy themes. No plays won a Pulitzer Prize for Drama in 1963. The 2012 revival of Albee's show won three Tony Awards, and stagings of the play around the world have thrilled audiences for decades.
